THE DAY THAT CHANGED LONDON

The London Marathon is a World Class Sporting event for both men and women.

Eighteen thousand, nine hundred and eighty one runners went swinging along in the rain on the 17th April to turn this famous marathon into a day of triumph. There was triumph for Britain, as Mike Gratton squelched home in first place in a time of 2.09.43 and for Norway when the first woman Grete Waitz made it in 2.25.29. There was triumph too for the competitors who raised thousands of pounds for charity

One million spectators braved the April showers and cheered and clapped along the 26 mile route from Greenwich to Westminster. There was a real carnival atmosphere as the runners warmed up for the start. Apart from the seasoned racers, the line-up included everyone from Buckingham Palace servants, celebrities and housewives to pensioners, wheel chair competitors and blind men. Submerged in the tidal wave of runners were three past or present members of the Caversham Club, Lindsay Fortune, Roslyn Dowland and Gordon Mitchell.

The whole of the Marathon was one of sheer exhilaration, the children holding out sweets, the various bands playing along the route, marching girls lined up with placards which had written "Keep running there's dancing at the end." Then there were the decorated flats and houses. All this was part of the experience, something never to be forgotten.

For the runners who had the time and energy to look around, the first famous Landmark was the Cutty Sark, a nineteenth century British Merchant Ship which now stands high and dry on the banks of the Thames at Greenwich. Then came the Tower Bridge, an unmistakable Buckingham Palace behind the competitors, the race finished on Westminster Bridge under the shadow of Big Ben. Excitement indeed!!!

Some finished in a sprint, some staggered, some held their hands aloft for their photo finish, while others plodded home zombie-like from exhaustion. It took half an hour to proceed through the finish system after receiving the magnificent gold medal, foil blanket, then a cup of hot Bovril and dairy-crunch chocolate.
